We are very fortunate for all the friends and well-wishers who care and trust us, unconditionally; and when the time is right, the visits will resume without any fear or hesitation.

We have experienced generosity from groups and friends even during the lockdown, and therefore feel that for most the wellbeing of themembers and staff of the homes is of utmost importance.

Otherwise, this year was full of activities, visitors, welcoming of newmembers, winding up of the Self Help Group Programme and initiating the Women Empowerment Programme with training in tailoring. Kamala's passing away was the greatest loss this year as she was ourvery first member in Charunibash, since 2005.

In Madhubati we came in contact with several helpful people who keep supporting us in this time of need. The contact list is growing from strength to strength and it is mostly by word of mouth, as FOKE is not really invested in promoting itself through social media.

Officially we completed our 15 years' journey on 8th December 2019. We thank each and everyone for the tremendous support throughout this magical and meaningful journey. Everyone's donations, support, friendship and trust kept the journey going on. Special blessings have always been on us and thus when we look back over the years gone by, we feel we have received in abundance and we have overcome many hurdles, and are stronger and wiser now for further development and growth. The staff, as always, is the backbone of FOKE and we pray for their continued wellbeing.

NEW RECRUITEMENT

Sandhya Mondal joined us from 1st March 2020 in Charunibash. Sandhya is slowly learning the works and is taking up responsibilities alongside the other staff. We welcome Sandhya in the FOKE family.

MEDICAL VAN

The second hand Tata Sumo van, which got donated to FOKE by way of a gift deed by CRDS, facilitated by Friends of Calcutta (FOC), served us for the last few years. Both FOC and FOKE used the car for medical purposes. However, because of its lifespan of 15 years it became difficult to renew its fitness. The expenses incurred for maintenance was becoming an extra financial burden for FOKE. Hence, it was decided that the vehicle wouldbe handed over / returned to FOC through a gift deed.

DONATION IN KIND

We are very glad to mention that a donation of worth Rs. 3,60,000 (Rupees 3,60 Lakhs) was received in kind. Other than groceries, food items, educational materials, lunches and other essentials, we received asset donations of washing machines, water purifiers, fans for both homes and a water tank for Bhalobasha.

REPAIR AND RENOVATION

Septic tank and pipe line installation for the members' bathrooms in Charunibash and installation of a new water tank in Bhalobasha were completed. Regular maintenance is carried out in both homes. We are growing common vegetables in Charunibash which is shared between the two homes, as are the fish from the pond.



ADMINISTRATIVE NEWS

Renewal of rent agreement of FOKE office.

The three years rent agreement for the FOKE office ended on 31st July 2019. This was renewed on 1st August 2019 for the next three years, until 31st July 2022, at Rs. 5000 per month, excluding electricity. N.B.: The office still remains to be a drop centre for the street children of the neighbourhood. They come there for various educational activities.

EXTENSION OF BHALOBASHA

New Man Corporation Inc., a Proprietorship firm, represented by its proprietor Mr. Chiradip Das, was selected by FOKE to carry out the extension project. The construction was supposed to begin from April 2020 but due to the Covid-19 pandemic the finalization of some legal paper works had to be delayed and also the gathering of sufficient labour became a challenge. It may be shared here that we have pledged to use child-labour free bricks (please see www.brickkilknnews.com for details) and, hence, did our survey to procure bricks from a specific brick kiln. We assure that the donation gathered from friends for the extension will be solely used for this particular purpose and we will keep you updated on the progress. Special thanks to Anik for helping us with the architectural design for the extension.

VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT

Surajit Das who was the co-ordinator of the outreach programmes – which includes the Self Help Group and the Follow-Up School, officially resigned in 2016, but continued on a part-time basis till September 2019. He has now resigned permanently. The members of the Self Help Groups are in the process of returning their loans and Surajit is helping them out as long as they need that support.





Saraswati Roy worked with us from 2008 until October 2019. There was a farewell and Saraswati was paid her due severance pack for all the years of service she had put in at Charunibash. We will miss her laughter and sense of humour in the house!



WELCOME HOME

Anjali Chakraborty was referred to us by a local NGO from Thakurpukur. Anjali is unmarried and has no relative to whom she can turn to in her time of need. Originally, an inhabitant of Bangladesh, Anjali came to Kolkata at a young age and started door-to-door sale of cosmetics and incense. With age and the inability to work Anjali soon spent all her savings and was on the verge of begging when she was given shelter and food in a primary school in Thakurpukur by a local NGO. However, as a prolonged stay in the school premises was not possible, they kept looking for a permanent home for Anjali. We visited Anjali in February 2019, but were only able to take her home after Kamala passed away.

On 11 May Anjali came to a very happy and happening home, as we were in the midst of our Rabindra Jayanti celebration. Anjali is a dignified lady with a pleasant personality and was well received by all.



Smritikona Ghosh is an elderly lady, nearly 80 years of age, with extremely poor health conditions. She was rescued by the staff of the Tala Police Station. With support from HIVE India, Smritikona was admitted to Sambhunath Pandit Hospital where she was treated for her injured right limb and general health. Her father died when she was very young and soon after his death Smritikona, along with her sister Gauri, was sent away to live with their maternal aunt and cousin. While Smritikona remained with her cousin, Gauri returned to the village. In later years the cousin left for a job to another city and Smritikona continued her life by providing private tuitions to students and found a job as a teacher in a private Hindi medium school. A parent from that school offered Smritikona to move in with them from her small rented house. Smritikona looked after their child, but after a few years when they decided to move away to their parental home,



Smritikona was asked to look for alternative accommodations. In fact. while living with the family she took a fall from which she never recovered. She managed to get herself admitted to the hospital with the intervention of HIVE India and the police authorities, but after her discharge from the hospital Smritikona had no home. The Tala Police Station approached FOKE and on 11 September 2019.

The policemen brought Smritikona to Bhalobasha, where she is now slowly settling down. She has a good sense of humour and does not like people doing her jobs for her. Though she uses a walker, she is independent and moves around very cautiously.

We visited Smritikona's friend in Dum Dum on 26 November 2019. with whom she kept all her documents and belongings. Smritikona



was very happy to meet the family and relieved to get all her important documents back. We have also located her sister Gauri, but sadly they do not have any interest in meeting one another.

LOKKHI SOREN

Lokkhi Soren was seen sitting in a state of unrest near the FOKE office on 11th December 2019. After some conversation it was understood that she belongs to the tribal community. She had been displaced for some reason, and had no home. We contacted the local Taltala PS who supported us with lodging a General Diary. Lokkhi was then admitted in Dr. Fuad Halim's nursing home for a general medical check-up.





On 24 December Lokkhi was taken home to Charunibash, which came as the greatest Christmas gift for all of us. In the first few months Lokkhi was hallucinating and wandered away a few times. She gives information in bits and pieces which we are trying to put together. Lokkhi is under medication and is very quiet in nature. We are hopeful that she will slowly find happiness and peace in the Charunibash family.



REST IN PEACE

Madhuri Mukherjee

It was sad to let Madhuri dida go. Madhuri came to us from Vidyasagar State General hospital where she was in the septic ward. She stayed with us for only a few months and for most of that time she was sick.

We visited the shop in the area where she lived and collected all her important documents. Later, we also visited her unmarried elder brother, nephew and niece with whom Madhuri wanted to stay, but sadly that was not to happen. Madhuri had some money in the bank which she was not able to enjoy and it will be forfeited as there is neither claim nor nominee in place. None were able to give the whereabouts of her elder son. In the span of the two months, she was hospitalised thrice and we did as much as we could for her peaceful passing.

The prayer service was carried out in Bhalobasha as her last few months were spent between Bhalobasha and the hospitals. Madhuri Mukherjee RIP 06.08.19



Kamala was on our food programme and was fairly young to be in the old age home. But she was considered for residential care due to her immobility problems. Even after prolonged orthopaedic treatment in the National Institute for Orthopedically Handicapped (NIOH) and elsewhere, Kamala remained with limited movement, Kamala came to Charunibash on 1 December 2005, when the house was still in the making and Charunibash became Kamala's home for the next 13 years. She was transferred to Bhalobasha last year as her health deteriorated and she needed to be in a room with close and easy toilet accessibility, as well as medical assistance.



Kamala was admitted to the hospital twice. The second admission was within one week of the first discharge and within only four days she suffered massive organ failure and sadly passed away on 28 April 2019 in Hope Foundation Hospital. Kamala's passing is the end of an era of FOKE, as she witnessed a lot of what FOKE and our Charunibash home evolved to be. She was fun-loving, witty and alert. With her unstable hand she was able to sew, knit and do crochet work. Her body gave up but her mind was active and enthusiastic till her last breath and she left the world in full consciousness. A prayer service in both homes were performed on May 1 with much love. The children in Bhalobasha were present at the prayer service.

MEDICAL NEWS

Jini took a fall and her right arm needed to be plastered.





Parul had her cataract operation which was not an easy job as she is diabetic and was not at all cooperative with the nurses and doctors; and in addition, she was unaware of all that was happening around her. The entire medical process with her was challenging.

Kalyani Das was admitted in Hope Hospital for check-up and psychiatric treatment.

Dasumi is undergoing a long term treatment in Bangur Hospital for swelling of the abdomen.

Lovely was admitted in Hope Foundation Hospital twice. The first admission was for psychiatric follow-up treatment and the second admission was due to a swelling in her right foot.

Anjali was admitted in S.S.K.M - Bangur Hospital and had a major operation on her right limb. Due to her sodium imbalance she took a fall and sustained a fracture.





Nemai and Maya Adhikari were taken to Calcutta Rescue clinic for their check-ups.

Hashikhusi, Ramlati, Dipali and Maya Roy were taken to Diamond Harbour Hospital several times for their follow-up treatments and pathological tests. The other members are on constant medical monitoring and Champa Chowdhury, the medical coordinator, visits both homes on a regular basis for checking each of them physically.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

FOLLOW-UP SCHOOLS

In Madhubati, the total number of children as on 31 March was 48 (26 boys and 22 girls) with 15 new admissions in the pre-primary level. 6 children dropped out because of moving away with family, or, simply, for wanting more time to play. Our teachers visited the families but they were not eager to return. Throughout the year teachers



arranged for evaluation of the students and 3 formal evaluations were conducted. The results are as follows: 9 students - 80%, 13 Students 65%, 9 students -50% and 2 students scored 30 %. Teachers visit homes in case a child is absent for more than 2 weeks or when there is any specific need.



In Bhalobasha the total number of students as on 31 March was 20 (12 boys and 8 girls). There were 5 drop outs and 8 new admissions in January 2020. As the number of children are fewer we try to meet the parents every 2 months, so, therefore, six meetings were conducted where the primary emphasis was given on child's education, parents' role in education, safeguarding children,

caring about the environment, use of plastic, hygiene and attendance. Minu Mondal volunteers to facilitate these parents' meetings. Children in Bhalobasha are evaluated every month. The final marks obtained were as following: 1 student-94%, 2-76%, 2-60%, 3-55%, 4-45%, 3-37%. There was no evaluation for the 3 nursery students. Home visits were done at the beginning and end of the year, or, as required. Attendance rate was 53% to 94%.

CASE STUDY

Sushmita Halder is 9 years old and a student of our Follow-Up School. She lost both her parents and her brother in an accident caused by electrocution when they went out in the field early in the morning. Sushmita was only about 1 or 1/2 years old when this happened and the news was published in one of the leading Bengali newspapers. Since then Sushmita has lived with her grandparents in Madhubati village. From when she was admitted in our Follow-Up School, she never missed a single day in class and always arrived before anyone else. The grandparents provided everything possible to the child within their meagre means. As she was growing up they faced many constraints; financially they were unable to provide for her basic needs. The child also needed emotional help as she craved attention. The grandparents requested us to provide a hostel facility for her and luckily we found a secure hostel and schooling for Sushmita in Sarada Nari-O-Sishu Ashram in Hotor, where the management also managed to find a sponsor for her. Both grandparents are happy and visit her twice a month and also attend the parents' meetings.





EDUCATIONAL SPONSORSHIP

We are continuing to sponsor the fees and other education costs for Suchismita Das in Loreto Sealdah, Tumpa Naskar in Lee memorial and Anamta Ali in A.K. Fazlul Haque Girls' Higher Secondary School.



MEDICAL CAMP

Dr. Tutul Chakraborty and Dr. Biva Dutta, both retired from their posts in Beleghata ID Hospital, carried out their annual health check-up through the Indian Public Health Association. On June 29 all the members of Charunibash received medical check-ups. However, due to heavy rain only 9 children were present; and they along with all the mothers present received a check-up. The visit was rescheduled again for 21 July where the rest of the children were screened.


EYE CHECK-UP CAMP by GKB OPTICALS





Over the past few years GKB Optical conducted, with great efficiency, eye check-up camps for the members in Charunibash and for the rural population in 3 villages around Madhubati. On 8 August we held a camp in which 120 patients were checked. Free spectacles were given out to 82 beneficiaries on 2nd November 2019.

IDEAS OF ALTERNATIVE LIVELIHOOD FOR RURAL WOMEN



On 8 January 2020 we organised a meeting in collaboration with the organization Behala Sujon Social Welfare Society. In this meeting both local women and all who were in our vocational training group participated. Ideas on making jute products, cloth bags, pickles, jam, etc., were shared by resource persons along with marketing strategies. However, we are yet to see it evolve as the interest is difficult to keep up if not organised in the best possible way. The lockdown has made it difficult to continue for now.

REVIVAL OF THE TAILORING UNIT

Many of you who have been connected with FOKE for years may remember that in 2009-2010 we used to run a tailoring unit in Charunibash when the 4 sewing machines were kindly sponsored by our long term friend Maura Allen. In 3 batches we had trained more than 30 women from the community and some sewing machines were also provided.



The second phase of the tailoring classes began when the request came from the local women who are mostly housewives and wish to earn and contribute to their families. As the call was from the women who were in no position to attend the training centre away from the village, it made sense to include it once more under our our outreach programme. On 14 July 2019 we started our first session with 10

participants, where the enthusiasm reflected clearly in each one. A very efficient and social minded tailormaster, Md. Saifuddin, who has his own tailoring business, took interest and appointed a young talented girl, Beauty Mondal, for conducting the classes. A nominal fee of Rs. 180 was decided to be paid for the 6 months course. The emphasis was more on practical teaching and learning. This batch ended with a written exam followed by a practical exam on 29 February 2020.

The second batch started on 1 March with 21 members and the enthusiasm was so high that the registering of names started while the first batch was still in process. The passing out group welcomed the new group and shared their experiences. Two classes were conducted before the lockdown was announced. The classes will revive as soon as the situation is stable. The trainees pay a nominal fee of Rs. 50 per month for the 6 months course. We have plans to include them all for income generation with their newly acquired skills.



ANNUAL SPORTS

On 23rd and 26th of January both homes celebrated sports day including the members, staff, and, in Bhalobasha, also the parents, as the numbers are small. In both places the event started with flag hoisting, being Netaji's Birthday and Republic Day, respectively. For sports there were prizes but there were also prizes for best performance and highest attendance. Every child received something. Shefali, who suffered a double stroke, participated in the game of throwing the ball in the bucket.





Blanket Run

On 27 December we did our annual blanket run on the streets of Kolkata. Here is Jhinku Banerjee's (committee member of FOKE) thoughts, who has enriched FOKE by gifting many professional and beautiful photos:



"It's heart-wrenching to see people sleeping under the open sky on such cold nights. FOKE, through a humble measure, extended some warmth to those people on the streets of our city. Adrienne, Sahadeb, Arundhati, Amit, Nazma (Saira's daughter), Raghavendra and Sanghita led the program and I got the chance to witness the sheer lov in people's eyes and to feel the warmth of hearts. I believe it was the touch. not the blankets, that brought glitters in the eyes of those people"

We are very grateful to Mr. Pradip Arora for donating us 50 beautiful soft blankets which we were happy to present to the nuns of Sarada Nari- O-Sishu Ashram in Hotor and to the very needy villagers of Madhubati.

OLDAGE HOME IN BODH GAYA

"Last year a few members from FOKE visited a home for the destitute elderly on the outskirts of Bodh Gaya. This home has very basic amenities and every bit of support was welcomed. Winters in this area are severe and the members of this home did not have enough winter clothing to fight the cold. The temporary structure and the vast open space

around the home made it very tough for them every winter. This year FOKE shared the blankets donated by Wrap With Love (Australia) to these members. They really appreciated this and accepted them gratefully. We would like to thank 'Wrap with Love' for their support on behalf of FOKE and Ms. Veda and her organisation, Sujata Buddha Welfare Centre in Bodh Gaya. We were also happy to extend our support with rations which was sponsored by a long-term friend Sorcha Saidlear."

SELF-HELP GROUP (SHG)

The SHGs started in 2008 for the rural women in and around Madhubati. We conducted an evaluation of this programme on 26 August 2019. The Resource Person was Satyajit Jana from Kajla Janakalyan Samity - an organisation which is expert in running more than a thousand SHGs in Midanapur District. The SHGs are a strong financial support system for the women as it provides loans for business, medical crises and personal needs. The three groups did very well with individual loans and timely returns, but didn't strive to turn it into group production. It was decided have that the groups

would become independent of FOKE, as they now haveenough experience to run it on their own. Each group leader contacts Surajit as and when required by them. The groups are continuing now by themselves and they have taken their ownership making it independent of FOKE.



RESCUE PROGRAMME

A better option for Shyamoli

Shyamoli was taken from the Vidyasagar State General hospital, We found her to be fairly young and could more accurately be described as a middle-aged woman than an elderly, and therefore would have seemed a little out of place in an old age home. We discussed this with Dr. Brahma of AVIEW, who willingly took Shyamoli on 6th April 2020 to their home for younger psychiatric female patients. This is our small effort to give Shyamoli a chance to enjoy once more the life of a younger person and to earn her dignity by contributing to society.



Being a diabetic patient, Shyamoli is monitored strictly. She is also working along with the other resident patients and has lost weight, which was required. However, it must be admitted that since Shayamoli has a personality disorder and for that reason is very stubborn, it is a great challenge to keep her within a set norm.

Finding a Home

On 25 September a gentleman named Sudipto Roy found us on social media and contacted us to help an elderly couple, who were helpless and living in Howrah Railway station. On receiving the information action was taken and Radhika, our friend and well-wisher, later shared her following thoughts:

"So finally this old couple has found a permanent home, in the safety and security of Kosish, the hospice, under Dr Dam's eagle eye. Sanghita and I saw them off on a train last night, and, they have reached and got settled this morning. An entire community of socially responsible citizens, from the gentleman who posted the original story, to Sanghita Mondal, of FOKE, who found them a temporary, immediate shelter, and managed to remove them from the horror of living in a railway station, to Dr Brahma, in Jibantala, who generously gave them that shelter, to my friend who chooses to remain unnamed, but whose generosity and kindness re-establishes my hope in humanity, to a colleague who braved the weeknight traffic in a crowded bus to deliver their bags for them at the Howrah station, to Dr Dam who went out on a limb to arrange for a residence for them and took time out of his busy day to receive them at the station, made this endeavour a success. A huge thank you to each person who stepped in to make their lives a bit better, who has believed in their genuine need and who has not indulged in long lectures on how one should save for old age and stay friends with relatives in the hope of them stepping up when the time comes.



As this episode comes to an end, I cannot help but share one observation. Every day, many of us come across many depressing incidents and images on the streets. From homeless old people to abused children, a sick and injured animal to domestic violence spilling onto the public domain - the list is endless. We certainly cannot address all of them. We can put the information out on social media, in the hope of someone else taking the responsibility of stepping in. We can call NGOs and CSOs, requesting help. And these are indeed powerful platforms which can transform lives.

But somewhere, somehow, are we shying away from our own social responsibility by posting on social media and hoping someone else will take up the job? If we can, should we not do a little more? Think about it. I am thinking as well about how we can change the way we do things.

SHORT-TERM CARE AND SHELTER

We were contacted by the councillor of Ward 140 to provide residential support and medical treatment for a middle-aged lady called Rani Bose. Her left foot looked extremely bad, as if gangrenous, which needed immediate surgery. If it was not treated in time an amoutation might have been the only option. With the help of a representative from the councillor, she was hospitalised, and, after her discharge, she was provided with all the necessary dressings, medication and a comfortable stay in Bhalobasha. She was too young to



be a resident in Bhalobasha. Sadly, Rani broke our trust with a lot of false information and we were very disappointed when we were not able to locate the family she claimed to have worked for and who, according to her-, had thrown her out of their home. When we looked further into the matter, we were able to contact her son and sisters with whom she eventually settled, but about whom she didn't want to share any information initially.

BRIEF REPORT ON THE VARIOUS RESCUES IRRESPECTIVE OF AGE OR GENDER OF THE PERSON IN NEED



A very young and beautiful girl was kept under supervision for more than two months before we were able to rescue her from Diamond Park on 6 April 2019. With Dr. Brahma's guidance we monitored the girl, provided her with a meal and medication every day, which Biplab, coordinator of Bhalobasha old age home -, carried out diligently. It was not an easy process to pick her up, as she was not cooperative. Finally, in the presence of Dr. Brahma, our team did manage to put her straight into our medical van and drive to Jibontala rehabilitation centre, run by AVIEW, where we had placed Barsha and Uma previously. She is progressing well and is much calmer and cooperative now.



On August 5, 2019 we received a phone call with the request to rescue an elderly man from Bansdroni. This was immediately followed up by our phone calls to the local police and respective officials, and during the next few hours of all this activity and reaching out made it possible for the man to be taken off the street. During the night he was admitted to Bangur Hospital and within a day the police located his family. His son said that he had wandered away from the house.

On 22 January 2020, on the way to the FOKE office, a very sick middle aged man (his name was later found to be Manoj Tanti) was rescued from Moulali. After several hours between Munchipara Police Station and Premdaan home (MCs), he was finally admitted.





On 8 February 2020, Sahadeb Some, our President, rescued a young man from Dum Dum with the help of the NGO Apna Ghar and he is now in their care. We visited him and he is slowly improving. Hopefully this is a great chance for this young man to once again enjoy a normal life.

On 21 March, the day before the lockdown was announced in India, a young man called Niraj Kumar Dubey was rescued from near Taratala. His mental condition was not sound and gave us the impression that he was lost. With the help of the Parnasree Police we were able to admit him in Vidyasagar Hospital and within a day we were able to contact his family. Sadly, due to the lockdown the family was not able to travel and Niraj was not willing to stay in the hospital. When he became violent, the hospital authority released him as he was a



threat to the other patients and staff. It was heartbreaking as we failed to unite him with his family, and, specially, knowing that Niraj may never get the chance to return to his family again, due to his unstable mental condition.


A young woman named Parbati, who was paralysed on the left side, as a result of a brain stroke. was abandoned by her husband and in-laws. Her two children live with her sister-in-law, while Parbati ended up in Sealdah railway station. She couldn't settle there and soon found a spot near the Moulali Masjid, opposite the FOKE office. The local women protected her, but



there was no shelter for her on the street. We contacted Calcutta Rescue (CR), who promised all medical support. Our friend and Assistant Secretary Arundhati opened her heart and home for Parbati and since 29 February Parbati found a home and family with Arundhati. The location of the CR clinic is in close proximity to Arundhati's home, which works perfectly for follow-up treatment. We are very thankful to Asif, the co-ordinator of the CR unit, for extending all medical support, including physiotherapy, cardiac treatment and other related medical examinations. Parbati was also hospitalised in between and is receiving physiotherapy in her present accommodation. The treatment is long term and we are hopeful to find a permanent place for Parbati, Thank you Arundhati and Asif for giving Parbati another chance.

FESTIVALS AND CELEBRATIONS
